al Distancing – Face Covering – Hand Washing – Indoor Air Quality reness for 'indoor air current entrainment'. Wear your mask if sitting under any air

d congregating indoors & out. Covid exposure is primarily a respiratory smission. Protect your breathing zone. Droplets travel. 6 ft.+ distance

ration – important year 'round. Mucous membranes = 1st line of defense

-quarantine after a questionable exposure.

tested if you start having symptoms of illness or there is a confirmed case among recent contacts.

cators include: Fever – Cough – Muscle ache – Diarrhea - Nausea

Farmers *Almanac* predicts "a light winter for most of the US. Warmer-than-normal temperatures forecast for large part of the country."



n create dangerous early AM road & bridge icing. Use extreme caution on commute.

e/snow precipitation: will thaw during day. Standing water = hydroplane hazard, plus ice er if wind-chill reaches freeze point.

ess in light layers to adjust for swing in temps. Outer garment should be high-viz.

treme cold — consider coveralls or bibs, boot, helmet & glove liner

ear face covering/ gaitor to minimize breathing cold (dry) air, which can be irritating. Stay drated. Wear eye/face protection.

cently a client advised **NO HOODIES** under a hard hat. Interferes with correct fit and spension. This makes sense. Use a proper helmet liner instead.



### FENSIVE DRIVING REMINDERS

**DISTRACTIONS**. FOCUS on the road. Hands-free phone. Limit calls.

<u>lerate your speed</u>. Posted limit = 4 wheeler passenger vehicle, daytime, dry road. All othe <u>UST SPEED FOR CONDITIONS</u>

t common accident: **following too close**. Allow 4-second interval.

rsections of all types = high crash frequency. Scan well ahead and all around your vehic W before entering intersection.

<u>not 'crowd' the stop line</u>. WAIT when signal turns green. Running a red light is common fail nterval for safe transit.

**time Running Lights =** 'hi-viz vest' on your vehicle. <mark>'Make Sure They SEE YOU'</mark> is one o ys of Defensive Driving.

r season; Glare; road icing; poor drainage; standing water; Road Rage (Holiday & Covid s ctive equipment; bad brakes/tires; long list of 'fails' contribute to crash hazard.

ect yourself at all times; in and out of the vehicle.

#### PE ON JOBSITES AND WHEN POUNDING STAKES



- ty glasses may fog up depending on temps. Use anti-fog spray; carry spare pair of glasses n tissue to wipe.
- types of a hard hat have a tight fitting, built-in face shield. No need for safety glasses with in place. Careful: Fogging may also be an issue in cold.
- d protection ANSI Level 8 is becoming new normal; with cut and impact protection
- suggestion: <u>pre-drill a stake pilot hole in difficult surface conditions. This lessens the impa</u> required from a hammer.
- AYS use a tool holder: keep hands free from strike zone. Use a 'stake holder' tool, Vis needle nose plier, etc.
- d awkward posture such as bending to ground level. This creates 'mis-strike' hazard.
- e pads: permit improved postural alignment & balance; less chance of mis-strike
- n from Best Practices; adopt these defensive measures as a best practice.
