WATCH OUT FOR KIDS AND SCHOOL BUSES!



- School is back in session so be alert and attentive for school bus routes and also the increased traffic associated with bringing kids to and from school
- School zones are typically posted with a very low speed limit, which all drivers are advised to follow carefully.
- Watch for school bus routes, increased traffic, vans and trailers with dorm room furniture, mattresses on road, etc.

SAFETY FOR THE HURRICANE ZONE



- Most fatalities and serious injuries occur AFTER the storm. Falls and chain saw incidents lead the list.
- A downed tree has a lot of energy like coiled spring. Electrocuting is also on the storm hazard list. Use extreme caution.
- If there is no clear emergency, WAIT until things even out and return to normal. 'No heroics' is the best policy.
- Avoid driving in high water when possible.

DEER ON ROADWAY: 'TIS THE SEASON



- This annual recurring issue of deer season poses a danger to traffic in the fall.
- Considering the risk and costs associated with a deer hit, if you're in an area with deer consider having deer whistles mounted on all company vehicles.
- Remind family members to be extra cautious as well.

COLLEGE BACK TO SCHOOL POSES EXTRA RISKS



- Associated issues at this time of year include heavy traffic volumes up and down the interstate with college bound loads of furniture and dorm room fixtures usually poorly secured on the roof of a small vehicle in many cases overloaded to begin with.
- Give these people a lot of clearance because those mattresses will fly and create a serious hazard.
- This goes the same when you see any potentially unsecured load ahead.

PREPARE FOR GLARE



- This is the time of year when we see the effects of increased glare in early morning and late afternoon. This condition can lead to glare blindness, in which case you could have a serious issue.
- Use proper tinted lens and/or visor adjustment to help lessen the effect.
- Safety Tip: if a driver is facing a glare blindness situation, there is actually no amount of high visibility apparel that is going to make you show up on their field of vision. The only preventive strategy is defense of positioning when you are on the ground.
- Otherwise, when in a vehicle you need to be ready to make some instant decisions...
